Course Description

Traditionally, there have been two types of communication law courses. One is essentially a mass media course, focusing on First Amendment issues crucial to newsprint or broadcast journalist. The other, far less common, approaches communications as a type of regulated industry. It focuses rather on the methods of distributing the content rather than the content itself. As such, the course of study in this latter approach focuses on the entry, pricing, and structural regulations that govern the 'pipes' through which we receive content. Recently, a third genre of academic approach has emerged. This most recent approach focuses on cutting edge developments in cyberspace. As you can see, none of these provide an introduction and comprehensive course of study that will prepare students for the array of modern communications problems. This course will seek to do just that.

Course Requirements
