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Course Objectives

This course explores the administrative, civil, and criminal enforcement of health care fraud and abuse laws and the penalties imposed on health care providers for a variety of unlawful activities. Specifically, the course examines the Anti-Kickback Statute, the federal anti-referral (Stark) law, federal false claims laws, exclusion authorities, and federal criminal statutes, as well as the strategies employed by the government to pursue health care violations and by defense attorneys who represent accused providers.

Course Requirements and Grading

Course Notes: This is an LL.M class, but JD students are encouraged to register, if space is available. During Spring 2018, the course will be offered in an online format. The course sessions will be a live lecture from 5:30 – 7:30 PM on Thursdays using Zoom technology viewable from any location with Internet access.

Requirements: In person attendance is **mandatory at the University of Houston Law Center** for the Investigation Workshop which is presently scheduled for April 12th and April 19th. General course attendance is required per Law Center attendance policy. If you anticipate that you will miss a class, please inform the professor by email in advance. Participation in class discussions is expected and, as set forth below, will comprise a portion of the grade.

Grading: There will be no final examination. Grades for the course will be determined as follows:

1. Completion of two short, written take home exercises – maximum 5 pages (40% each)
 - First exercise due February 26, 2018 at 3:00pm
 - The exercise will be made available beginning February 22, 2018.
 - Second exercise due May 10, 2018 at 3:00pm
 - The exercise will be made available beginning May 1, 2018.
 - Students must complete the exercise within 90 hours.
2. Class Participation (20%) – presentation of at least one “Hot Topic” and participation in problem workshops
3. During the semester, students will have the opportunity to complete an additional, written exercise for extra credit which may be applied to their lowest written exercise score.
