It is my expectation that students are prepared for each class offered throughout this course. Preparation is an essential requirement when in court as well as dealing with clients. Consider this course an opportunity to internalize that ethic.

The aims of the course are to teach you the substantive law of contract, to encourage you to think about why we have particular rules, to consider ethical considerations underlying the practice of law generally, and of contract law in particular, and to integrate theoretical

and practical aspects of substantive contract laws with the transactional nature of contract practice (i.e. helping clients plan, negotiate, and draft the documents that will carry out that planning).

Finally, I request that you stand whenever you address the class.

### III. Course Requirements

Students are responsible for being present pursuant to administrative policy. Reading assignments are tailored to ensure a manageable amount of material for each class. The materials covered in the readings are the starting point - not the goal - of each day's class. The student who desires to master the concepts must expect to engage in additional analysis and synthesis.
