COURSE OVERVIEW:

This two-hour course provides hands-on training and instruction on the process of Trademark prosecution, pre-application searching and from client admonishment through the filing of renewal documents ten years after registration. Particular attention will be paid to the bases for application-filings and common refusals. Class discussion will cover current issues in trademark law and focus on law, precedent, and the USPTO's Trademark Manual of Examining Procedure. The course will also familiarize students with the electronic systems used by the trademark bar for searching databases of current registrations and pending applications. filing electronic applications. responding to official correspondence issued by the USPTO. Upon completion of this course, students will have the knowledge and understanding required to prosecute a trademark registration for others when licensed to practice law.
