- understand and identify overarching tort law principles, theories, and policies;
- · identify and consider ethical and professional questions raised by the course materials;
- have knowledge and understanding of substantive tort law;

- understand, identify, and articulate policy arguments commonly used in tort law;
- articulate and express a well-informed opinion regarding torts-related issues;

IV. Professionalism

A. COVID-19 Considerations and Precautions

Wearing masks, practicing safe hygiene, and being fully vaccinated are the best ways of reducing COVID infections and transmissions. B. Class Preparation

All students are to read the entire assignment in preparation for each class meeting and participate in class discussions. I will call on students at random, although I will typically announce a three-student panel at the beginning of each class. If you are unprepared when I call on you, you will be marked absent for the day. The second time you are unprepared, your final grade for the course will be lowered by 1/3 (e.g., a B becomes a B-). Any student who is unprepared for more than two days during the semester may be dropped from the course.

I want to address each of you in a manner that corresponds to your identity. My usual practice is to address students by their surnames (*e.g.*, Ms. Nguyen, Mr. Perez). I will gladly honor your request to address you by an alternate name or gender pronoun. Your

chosen names and preferred pronouns will be respected in our classroom. Please feel free to reach out to me at any time if you have any concerns about how your classmates or I address you.

I respect your time and education by doing my best to start and end our class meetings promptly. Doing so requires that you be logged onto Zoom and ready to begin at the time (that is, before) this class is scheduled to start. Please be prompt, as *you will be counted absent if you are late.*
