Oil and Gas Tax Course Overview and Learning Objectives

Oil and Gas Tax covers the United States federal income taxation of domestic oil and gas operations and transactions. The course examines taxation associated with the life cycle of oil and gas operations including exploration, development, production, and abandonment. The study of transactions involving oil and gas interests analyzes acquisition, disposition, structuring, and investment. Course participants learn the historical context and development of oil and gas provisions in the U.S. tax law as a basis for learning the laws and regulations that apply today. Current tax legislative proposals and/or final legislation affecting the oil and gas industry will be addressed as warranted throughout the semester. The emphasis is on federal income taxation of domestic oil and gas transactions, although certain international tax aspects of the oil and gas business will be referenced and contrasted throughout the class.

Prerequisites

Oil and gas law and basic federal income taxation are helpful prerequisites but not required.

General Class Guidelines

A full assignment sheet will be posted online at the Oil & Gas Tax site on UH Canvas -- the central communication tool for the class. The Wright Casebook will provide specific cases, rulings, statute, and regulation references as well as problems on each topic and will serve as the primary discussion materials for each class. Supplemental readings will be posted from the Wolters Kluwer Editorial Staff text should the student desire further details presented in a text format. The assignment sheet will be updated and posted to UH Canvas throughout the semester as needed. Students can also refer to the Polevoi text that is available in the UHLC Law Library.

Students should focus on cases, rulings, statutes, regulations, and other materials from the assigned pages in the Wright Casebook for each class. Each topic has problems, and these will be discussed in detail during each class. Answers to the problems in the Wright Casebook will be posted on our class site.

Class will be conducted utilizing a mixture of lecture and random recitation on the cases, problems, and other assigned materials. Active participation will be expected by all students. If you are not prepared for class, please let me know in advance, but class attendance is strongly recommended whether or not prepared. Active participation in classroom discussion and problems may be reflected positively in your final grade -- excessive lack of preparation or absences may be reflected negatively in your final grade.

Note that Oil and Gas Tax will be offered in the "Face-to-Face" mode. Students must attend 80% of our classes which will be tracked by a "sign-in" sheet each class. Failure to meet the 80% attendance requirement (attending *at least* 22 of the 27 classes) will be reported to the Office of Student Affairs (OSA). All classes will also be recorded and available via a Zoom link posted on our UH Canvas site and/or on MediaSite for your reference during the semester. The recordings allow student review of materials that may not have been clear on the first pass.

PowerPoints will be used extensively in class and should serve as a guide to a course outline. Note also that *eligible students may elect a Pass/Fail grading option*. If P/F is not elected, students will be assessed consistent with the standard UHLC assessment guidelines including the class participation adjustment outlined in this Syllabus.

Office Hours

I can be available before each class and/or after each class. If you desire to meet separately, please send an email requesting an appointment. Should you have questions on any materials covered during class, or any issues arising from your readings, feel free to send an email and I will provide input either by return email or during the next class meeting.

Final Exam

A three hour final examination will be administered to determine your class grade. The exam will consist of five essay questions, generally requiring a 2-3 page responses that will count for 50% of the grade. Short answer questions will count for 30% of the grade and True/False questions will count for the final 20% of the grade. The exam will be a closed book, in classroom exam. Students are not to seek or secure help from others including the use of *any* Artificial Intelligence systems that might be available as this would be a violation of the Honor Code discussed below. We will plan to use the EBB Portal in “shut down mode” for our “in classroom” exam. Any updates to the exam administration will be announced closer to the exam to comply with any guidance that might be announced/implemented by the Administration specific to this exam period. You are responsible for anything covered in class as well as any assigned reading materials whether or not highlighted in class.

AI Generated Text

The software technology known as artificial intelligence has recently expanded its capability to generate text (AI Generated Text). Examples of the technology include what are known as “generative” large language models (LLMs), and a specific implementation what is well known in the general public is ChatGPT. These systems can generate text in response to prompts and/or input of other text/documents/code/images. The output, the AI Generated Text, appears to have human-mimicking “intelligence” and is thus potentially usable as a substitute for written work product one might generate themselves. AI Generated Text can include computer code or programs as well as human language content.

This applies to AI Generated Text from yourself or others. This pledge includes that your assessment work product in the course is without any contribution from AI Generated Text.
