- 8. **Pre-requites:** Trial Advocacy
- 9. **Introduction:** This course will focus on in-depth analysis, planning, and practice of preferred systems and techniques for trial advocacy in the federal system. The analytical skills to be emphasized are: (1) Integrating legal requisites with evidentiary story telling; (2) Theme development; (3) Effective opening statements; (4) Effective handling of exhibits and real evidence; (5) effective direct questioning; (6) effective cross examination; (7) Effective closing argument; (8) Vocabulary development; and (9) offering and opposing evidence.
- 10. **Course Objectives:** This is an advanced course offered to students who have been exposed to the basic concepts of trial advocacy theory and practice.

We hope to accomplish two goals. First, you will develop skills that will make you a better lawyer. Second, you will develop a more mature understanding of trial advocacy in terms connected to adjacent questions about learning, rationality, ethics, organizational behavior, and other fields. Specifically, this course should help you prepare persuasive presentations in a purposeful and thoughtful manner and critically evaluate outcomes and experiences.

11. **Trials:** There will be two trials during the semester. You are responsible for bringing your own witnesses to each trial. You are responsible for bringing a juror to jury selection night.

12. Grading & Attendance:

- a. Attendance is mandatory. Unexcused absences will reduce your grade.
- b. You will be graded every class period on your performance and preparation. You must be prepared to be the witness and examine the witness every class period in which we do direct and cross. You must be prepared to both open and close when those exercises are assigned.
