#### **Learning Objectives/Outcomes/Goals:**

Welcome to Texas Pretrial Procedure! I want you to learn the Texas Rules of Civil Procedure. Knowledge of these rules is essential in any litigation practice in Texas. By the end of this course, I hope you will know enough about the rules and the structure of the rules so that you could navigate comfortably as a young lawyer in a litigation practice. I also hope to use the rules as a platform to teach you how to think like a lawyer and, more important, ask questions like a lawyer.

The successful practice of law requires a variety of skills. Not all of us have the skills to successfully practice law. I have seen some of the smartest people I have ever encountered fail at the law. The most basic skill set is knowing the language of the law. Procedure is the structure of the law. No idea, no matter how powerful, will ever become the law unless it is presented in a way courts decide cases. That is procedure.

Below is a list of readings from the casebook and other sources. The list is not exhaustive. There will be certain other readings, and it may at times become necessary to deviate from the syllabus. I will let you know sufficiently in advance if this occurs.

# MY POLICIES FOR CONDUCTING CLASS PROFESSOR SCHWARTZ

NOTE: Some of you may be tempted to scan over the below policies, or simply skip them altogether. This is inadvisable, and may put you at a disadvantage when it comes to your final exam.

- 1. Welcome to the course in Texas Pretrial Procedure! This is an important subject to study; it isn't always fascinating, but it is among those in which your hard work is most likely to be rewarded when you practice law. Unfortunately, most of this class will be lecture, but I encourage class participation. I am sure you have heard that law school teaches you to "think like a lawyer." However, I think it is equally important to learn to question like a lawyer.
- 2. <u>Consider carefully before taking this course.</u> This is the tenth year that I am teaching this course. Each year I strongly solicit candid evaluations. I earnestly want to learn what I am doing right and what I can do to improve my teaching. So, let me set your expectations now. If you want a PowerPoint presentation in class, if you think the professor should stick strictly to the book and the reading assignments, and if you think the professor should not talk about Federal Civil Procedure because this course is about Texas Civil Procedure, then this course is not for you. I will also include the following question in your examination: "Did you submit a written evaluation for this course? Yes or No."
- 3. You are responsible for knowing everything that is covered in class, and everything in the assigned reading materials. In my class, we will approach litigation issues like a real-world lawyer. Real law does not come in PowerPoints, outlines to memorize, and bullet points. A guy with a pretty good reputation in the law once said, "The life of the law has not been logic; it has been experience." In my class, we talk about why we have certain rules, where the rules come from, and what the consequences (good and bad) of a particular rule are.
- 4. <u>Class conduct.</u> My longtime personal opinion is that law schools fail to teach professionalism. Law schools might teach you law and even teach you legal ethics, but they utterly fail, in my view, to teach you how to be a respected and professional lawyer. Accordingly, (1) you are free to criticize any idea, you are free to destroy any argument, and you are encouraged to prove the professor wrong, but (2) you are never free to criticize another person or to act unprofessionally in this class. You should consider this class as the first day of your professional life.
- 5. You need not tell me why you are absent. If you are absent, I assume you have a good reason. As long as you comply with the law school's attendance requirement, which mandates 80% attendance, I do not need to know the reason. In order to encourage class attendance and participation, I will include questions in the examination about matters we discussed in class that are not in the book. I will take roll every class.

- 6. You need not tell me that you are unprepared. It is your responsibility to read forward in the casebook according to the syllabus so as to be prepared for class. Unless I indicate otherwise, we will go straight through the syllabus. I personally think the class will be worthless to you without preparation. But, I am not going to criticize you if you don't read the assignment. I am not even going to call you out. But, before you make the choice not to prepare for class, I encourage you to watch the Academy award winning film, The Paper Chase. In that movie (made long before cell phones), Professor Kingsfield tells his student, Mr. Hart, "Mr. Hart, here is a dime. Take it, call your mother, and tell her there is serious doubt about you ever becoming a lawyer."
- 7. Pass/Fail. This class may not be taken pass/fail.
- 8. <u>Final Examination; Grading.</u> Your grade for the course will be determined by an anonymous final examination (to the extent possible), except if you are disrespectful to another student in my class, in which case your grade will be adjusted downward. The exam will not be a spot the issue exam. I have determined not to use the long essay format because I have come to the unfortunate conclusion that there is too high a correlation between typing skills and scores. The exam will be open book and open resource as long as you are solely responsible for the exam answers. But, you cannot use AI for two reasons. First, the law school says so. Second, AI is stupid. This is a reasoning class. AI cannot reason and I don't care how many billionaires tell me that I am wrong.

Anything covered in class or in the assigned reading (or even in this syllabus) is fair game. (And, that includes things I mention in class that are necessary for cultural literacy as a lawyer.) The final grades are based on a curve. In past years, it was fairly easy to identify the A to B+ exams, the middle performing exams, and the unacceptable exams.

- 10. <u>Syllabus Changes</u>. Please note that I may need to make modifications to the course syllabus and may do so at any time. I will announce all changes as quickly as possible.
- 11. <u>Synchronous Online Courses</u>. Online class meetings will take place according to the class schedule. There is no face-to-face component to this course. This course will have a final exam per the University Schedule. The exam will be delivered electronically, at the specified date and time.
- 12. <u>Remote Classes</u>. For any student using the classroom's internet videoconferencing capability for synchronous distance education via remote presence, there are a number of requirements you must meet:
  - i. you must be connected to the internet videoconference when class starts;
  - ii. your computer must have a working video camera and quality audio capability, joining by audio-only due to your lack of video capability may be treated as an absence (you may need an external mic or headset for sufficient audio quality);

- iii. if your computer is a laptop, you must not be distracted by traveling or other activities when you join the internet videoconference;
- iv. you may not join the class session internet videoconference from a phone;
- v. you must listen closely and speak loud and clear, as hearing students speak in the classroom and classmates ability to hear the remote presence student may not be optimal;
- vi. you must identify yourself with your class roll name in the internet videoconferencing software:
- vii. you must present your face and upper body area professionally in the video stream, eating "on-camera" is not a professional presentation;
- viii. you must be able to fulfill your responsibilities if called on to discuss a case or course materials; and
- ix. you must manage the "mute button" when remote to keep a professional demeanor.
