# **Course Description**

This course covers the doctrines, underpinnings and policy of property law. We will examine what makes property rights distinctive; how property rights are created, transferred, and destroyed; and what the powers and duties of property owners are.

#### **Course Objectives**

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- understand and identify overarching property law principles, theories, and policies;
- identify and consider ethical and professional questions raised by the course materials;
- have knowledge and understanding of substantive property law;
- understand, identify, and articulate policy arguments commonly used in property law;
- articulate and express a well-informed opinion regarding property-related issues; and
- develop skills in legal analysis, reasoning, research; problem-solving; and written and oral communication related to property law.

#### Class Design:

Class format uses an adult learning model. It is highly interactive and participatory with its success, depth and breadth contingent upon student willingness to contribute. In each class, we will discuss the readings. The focus of this class is on conversation and discussion at a level that promotes critical thinking and analysis of property law.

#### **Attendance**

Attendance is required for this face-to-face class. Please arrive on time. Any student missing more than eight (8) classes will be dropped from the course and reported to UHLC administration. Attendance will be taken at every class. If you will need to miss a class, please email me in advance. You do not need to state a reason. Each absence will count toward the maximum of eight (8) missed classes.

AI Generated Work Product may not be used in the development or drafting of any assessments created by you in a non-proctored environment, such as a "take-home" final examination.
